



FORMER OATLEY BOWLING CLUB SITE

As you may be aware Georges River Council has forwarded the Planning Proposal for the former Oatley Bowling Club Site to the Greater Sydney Commission for a Gateway Determination under section 56 of the Environmental and Planning Assessment Act 1979.

If this Determination is successful, the site will be developed into seniors housing facilities following reclassification of the site from Community Land to Operational Land and re-zoning. Operational Land can be leased or sold.

Our Federal Member of Parliament, David Coleman, has expressed his opposition to this proposal. He has further stated to some of our members that if residents are opposed to this proposal then they should also express their opposition to the newly elected Georges River Councillors.

Mr Coleman pointed out that this the Council's own development proposal and they can withdraw it if they are persuaded to do so. The Society has recently sent a letter to all newly elected Councillors on Georges River Council urging them not to proceed with the re-zoning of the Bowling Club site. We urge all OFF members to write their own letter to Councillors. To assist, here are a few points you might make:

- * the land is public land zoned for Public Recreation;
- * the site is not suitable as it is within bushfire prone zone;
- * access for emergency vehicles is inadequate;
- * building construction would have an adverse affect on surrounding Turpentine- Ironbark Forest, an Endangered Ecological Community.

SPRINGVALE MINE - THE ONGOING SAGA

A year ago we reported in *OFF News* that the Environmental Defenders Office (EDO) was appealing the decision to allow Springvale coal mine in the Blue Mountains to discharge large amounts of contaminated mine water into the river system that forms part of Sydney's drinking water catchment.

In August, the NSW Court of Appeal ruled that the mine needed to comply with the requirement that developments in the catchment must have a "neutral or beneficial effect" on the quality of the water. In October, the NSW Government moved to pass legislation in order to nullify the Court ruling thus seriously weakening the laws to protect Sydney's catchment. Lock the Gate has issued a Call to Action – to tell the Premier that a rogue coal mine should not compromise Sydney's drinking water. www.lockthegate.org.au/springvale_call_to_action

DIEBACK DISEASE FOUND IN MYLES DUNPHY RESERVE

Analysis of soil samples taken from an area of Myles Dunphy Reserve has confirmed that a significant section of the bushland is infected with phytophthora cinnamomi - a soil-borne water mould that produces an infection in many native plants resulting in dieback. Unfortunately the infection is permanent and while it can be controlled and measures taken to stop the spread, it will remain in the soil.

An article in the most recent Georges River Bushcare Volunteers newsletter - Tucoerah - provides more details about the disease and the precautions bushcare volunteers and those who regularly walk in the bush, should take to stop the spread of infected soil. MURRAY-DARLING PROBLEMS - 30 YEARS AGO

The fight for the environment is long and repetitive. Following Jim Vickery's October talk on the Murray-Darling Plan, I note that in *OFF News* (Oct/Nov 1987), there is an item titled "Murray-Darling Problems", which reports the "historic agreement to form a Murray-Darling Basin Commission". It suggests this is the result of growing concern about widespread land degradation, poor water quality, rising ground water levels, loss of wildlife and vegetation, over-grazing and clearing.

The item quotes the amazing statistic that more than 1.3 million tonnes of salt flows over the South Australian border each year. It is hoped that the Plan will mean for the first time governments will co-ordinate management approaches to this much-battered resource. How much has improved over the past 30 years???

BIRD SURVEYS

Birdlife Australia have released an app, "Birddata" which can be used to record bird observations while in the field. The app is free and is suitable for both [Apple](#) and [Android](#) phones and is available from the usual app stores.

Research has shown that long term regular bird counts are the most informative way of recording changes in populations and distributions of birds. We plan to establish a number of observational sites in the Oatley area in the near future and hope that our members will record their observations using this app. The app contains a number of options but the one that we will be standardising on is the 20 minutes, 2Ha survey.

All that is required is to find the survey point on the map in the app and then record all the birds seen or heard within the 2Ha area (200m by 100m) over 20 minutes. The app will advise when the 20 minutes is completed and then ask you to submit or edit. If you are confident on your observations just select submit and the data will be then sent to the Birdlife Australia database where it will be checked for consistency before it is formally added into the database. In 2018 OFF will run a number of workshops on how to use the app including practical demonstrations in the field. Three sites have already been set up in Poulton Park and anyone can now use the app to add data into the database. For more information see www.birdlife.org.au/projects/atlas-and-birdata
